

S1400 Lung-MAP Pathology Webinar Q+A Reference Document

Session 1 (February 1 st , 2017)	
Q:	Can tissue submitted for testing come from the adjuvant resection, or must it be from the metastatic biopsy?
A:	Archival <u>or</u> new biopsy tissue is acceptable. Any site with enough tumor tissue (primary or metastatic) is acceptable for submission.
Q:	Is it okay to dry the slides in a 37C oven rather than air drying?
A:	Please submit <u>unbaked</u> slides (do not put them into an oven).
Q:	When substudy G opens, will patients enrolled to S1400I who are HRRD+ be eligible for a substudy reassignment?
A:	Yes, all currently enrolled patients who are eligible for reassignment to S1400G will be notified. [Note: S1400G opened on 2/7/2017 and notification emails were sent on 2/8/2017. If you have questions regarding a specific patient, please contact S1400question@crab.org.]

Session 2 (March 20 th , 2017)	
Q:	Is it acceptable to check with another institution for available tissue for a potential lung-MAP patient prior to obtaining consent?
A:	It's important to obtain consent prior to confirming the patient's banked biospecimens with another institution. The patient needs to be aware that you're seeking to use their tissue for a clinical trial.
Q:	If tissue has to be resubmitted, does that also require a 16-day turnaround for results?
A:	Yes, the same turnaround time applies to all tissue submissions. Therefore, the clock does start at zero for resubmissions. The good news is that the mean turnaround time for testing at FMI is 9 days.
Q:	Could the assessment of tumor density be somewhat subjective? Should Pathologists be concerned if they want a second opinion?
A:	There is indeed a learning curve associated with making this kind of call, and it gets easier and more accurate with experience. Getting a second opinion is recommended in cases where there is doubt that the sample contains less than 20% tumor density.
Q:	Does the treating physician get a copy of the full NGS report when registering for pre-screening?
A:	The full NGS report is provided to the physician at the time of sub-study assignment, which happens at progression for pre-screened patients. Submission of the S1400 Notice of Progression Form is required to receive a sub-study assignment. The sub-study assignment should be received from the SWOG Statistical Center within 1 day of submission of the S1400 Notice of Progression (as long as at least 16 days have passed since tissue submission).
