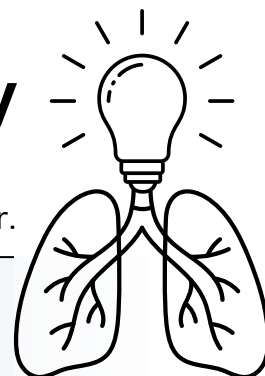


Welcome to the INSIGHT study

The INSIGHT study is trying to get a better understanding, or **insight**, about how best to care for people who were treated for non-small cell lung cancer.



Participation Guide

Your Care Team

Your Treatment Plan

You've been randomly assigned to one of 2 groups.

Group 1: New Approach
Treatment with durvalumab



You'll receive treatment once a month, for about 1 year.

or

Group 2: Usual Approach
Close monitoring



Your doctor will carefully monitor your health for about 1 year.

Group 1 Schedule

You'll get durvalumab through an IV (a needle placed into a vein in your arm or into your port) once a month, for about a year. This will take at least an hour each time.

You'll get CT scans about every 3 months for a year. You'll continue to get CT scans after the first year, but less often.

Your study visits will continue for a total of 10 years.

Group 2 Schedule

You'll get CT scans about every 3 months for a year. You'll continue to get CT scans after the first year, but less often.

Preparing for Your Visits



On days you get durvalumab (Group 1 only)

- Wear something that makes it easy for your care team to access your arms or your port.
- Consider bringing an extra layer of clothing, socks, or a blanket to help keep you warm during treatment.
- Ask your care team if you can bring food or drinks.

! Talk to your care team before bringing someone with you to appointments.



On days you get a CT scan

You may be asked to change into a hospital gown.

But if you'll be wearing your own clothes during the scan:

- Wear loose-fitting clothes if possible.
- Wear clothes without any metal, such as buttons, zippers, or underwires.



For all visits

- Consider bringing something to keep you entertained — like a book, magazine, or tablet.
- Remember to bring earbuds or headphones if you plan to listen to music or watch something on a device.
- Bring glasses if you need them to read forms or fill out study questionnaires.



Your Responsibilities

It's important to:

- Keep your study appointments.
- Continue using your approved method of birth control until 6 months after you finish treatment with durvalumab.
- Speak with your study doctor before joining any other research study.

Tell your care team about:

- Any side effects you're having
- All medications and supplements you're taking
- Any doctors' visits or hospital stays you have outside this study
- Any pregnancy, for you or your partner, that happens from the time you join the study until 6 months after you finish treatment with durvalumab
